REMEMBER THAT TONGUE LAB FROM LAST MONTH?!

Dentist and Sharon parent Ryan Schwendiman reminds us: "Without your tongue, you would not be able to talk, sing, swallow, or taste food. When you are using your tongue to eat and swallow, it traps bacteria. Over time, the bacteria builds up and can cause 'halitosis' or bad breath. Because your tongue traps all that bacteria, it can be a little tricky to clean. The easiest way to clean it is by using a tongue scraper. A tongue scraper can help remove harmful and stinky bacteria. They are easy to use, and it only takes a few seconds. I would recommend using a tongue scraper a few times a week to help keep your mouth and breath fresh."
